For the second season running and reflecting the ongoing pandemic, SLSA Wales's activities were severely restricted. Your Board of Trustees, took an early decision to keep all memberships categories, at a rate of £5, to reflect this. However and it is very pleasing to report, that despite our reduction in activities, our membership numbers remain fairly strong with an overall total of 2778.

2022 will hopefully see most if not all our activities return and it is the reason the Trustees will be asking the Annual General Meeting (AGM) to approve the membership fees being raised to pre-pandemic levels, i.e. nippers/juniors ~ £12, seniors/masters ~ £14.

Due to a change in insurance provider and an increase in the insurance cover offered to our members, the Trustees are also recommending an increase in club affiliation and insurance fees. As well as Public Liability and Personal Accident insurance, our new insurance also gives Employer Liability, which covers all our clubs as well as the Board of Trustees. For this the Trustees are asking the AGM for agreement in raising club affiliation fee by £10 to £40 and club insurance fee by £15 to £100.

Here's hoping for a good summer for everyone and please keep safe.

Over 400 awards were taken and passed, which, considering the climate is quite remarkable.

A lot of work and negotiation was carried out in the early part of 2021 as we came out of lockdown, to prioritise those awards needed by clubs for safety cover and those needing to renew awards for employment. A great success by everyone involved.

Once again a huge amount of work has been going on in the background to review and revise the National Beach Lifeguard Manual which Surf Life Saving Wales jointly own the intellectual property rights to, along with the RLSS. The result of this review can now be seen in the new manual and we have just taken delivery of the first new copies. The expert panel that went through the manual, sentence by sentence was Lyle Bluck, Daren Williams, Hugh Murray along with representatives from RLSS.

Establishing and building links with like-minded rescue organisations has always been a priority of the commission and Surf Life Saving Wales now sits on a number of forums.

Sport Commission Report

Every year we work hard in the sports commission to bring you an action packed events calendar. With the challenge of COVID continuing again this year the commission focused on supporting clubs, grass roots athletes and fostering the focus of our events to fun over high level competition.

With that we relaunched the evening twilight series for our youth and senior athletes. These were a great success with over 130 athletes taking part in 2 locations over 4 weeks. It was great to see clubs back on the beach supporting each other and cheering each other on with the focus on mass participation and having fun as well as the occasional tight dash for first place thrown in to keep the excitement levels high.

After this success we were then able to run a specific twilight to assist the new nipper juniors who wouldn't have competed at the junior level before due to COVID. The determination of the athletes to master and control the larger racing mals in some tricky wind conditions was a credit the coaching teams in each of the clubs represented.

None of these events can run without the support of many in our commission and from other areas of SLSA Wales so I would like to thank all those officials, helpers, parents, boat crews who helped to organise and support the twilight programme. These are a great introduction to the sporting events and I would encourage all members to turn up and have a go and this fun focused competition.

Whilst 2021 was another quieter season on the beach and in the pool, we have been working behind the scenes to improve our offerings, events and compliance with the wider sporting community. United Kingdom Anti-doping (UKAD) recently relaunched a new assurance framework which meant a big change in our policies on anti-doping. We can successful say we have met the criteria to become fully accepted under the new regulations. We also have 5 members of the sports commission team set up as "Clean Sport Advisors" who can signpost athletes to the appropriate information regarding, anti-doping, supplement use and TUE's. This education and testing focus will form a greater impact in the coming years as we work with specific groups of coaches and athletes.

As I write this we hope 2022 will bring a more normal sporting calendar to lifesaving in wales but should your club wish to run their own event next year then get in touch and we can see how we can help you.










Incident and Rescue Figures

Shown below is a summary of the record of incidents and rescues for last summer (2021). In total 15 people have been saved during that period and advice given to a staggering 311 members of the public; so, is there a better endorsement of the invaluable service the volunteers of Surf Life Saving, Wales provide?

Looking at the table above, although highlighting the fantastic work of our volunteers, the numbers themselves, do not describe the humanitarian picture behind them.

Over the last 26 years, since digital records were first kept in 1995, the voluntary lifeguards of our lifesaving clubs have rescued **1776** people. That is an incredible endorsement of the outstanding efforts our members deliver. But it is not all about rescues, prevention is key and to forward that aim over the same period, we have given over half a million pieces of advice to the visitors on Welsh beaches.

As students have been subject to quite strict covid measures in our residential environment we have not been able to take students to venues to complete the beach awards. We have been continuing with pool based training and basic first aid but have not completed any awards. As we have not provided any volunteers for the RNLI programme this year the need to certificate students was lessened however we have upskilled 3 staff members and they have gained their NVBLQ to help with supporting and supervising our planned beach activities and ongoing lifesaving training for students. This year, we hope to enter a small cohort of students into the NVBLQ towards the end of the season.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities:

Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

To save lives on all beaches in Wales in particular but not exclusively by:

- 1. Promoting, improving and controlling the work of beach life saving, resuscitation and first aid.
- 2. Developing and improving national and international standards of life saving.
- 3. Developing and improving beach life saving methods and equipment.
- 4. Establishing and maintaining national and international life saving qualifications.
- 5. Co-operating with all organisations with similar aims.

To help young people, especially but not exclusively through providing the facilities for young people to participate in organised life saving as a voluntary vital public service and to take part in beach and water sports, so as to develop their capabilities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society.

Significant activities

The focus of the activities is that we teach voluntarily from the age of 7 years to 70 years Lifesaving & First Aid Awards.

- 7yrs Nipper pool and beach competence.
- 12 /15 years Beach and Pool Lifesaver Levels 1 and 2.
- 16yrs Plus NVBLQ Beach Lifeguard Awards, Racing Ski Competence, Emergency Aid 1,2 & 3, Emergency Responder, IRB Driver, IRB Crew & IRB Cox, Masters Surf Lifesaver Award, Trainer/Assessor, Tutor.
- Nipper & Youth Camp held every year at Celtic Farm St. David's with over 300 children at Nipper Camp (8-11 Years) and over 250 children at Youth Camp (12 14 years) all completing competency awards and learning valuable Lifesaving skills.

To deliver these awards for the benefit of all, ages by developing their self-confidence and social skills alongside practical activities for all ages. We welcome all persons regardless of personal background, faith, gender or personal circumstances and we believe this philosophy of openness to all enriches everyone through the sharing of the skills, aptitudes and life experiences of all ages 7 years to 70 years and all volunteers.

A great contribution is made by, member volunteers. We are grateful for the many hours volunteers have spent listening and encouraging our young people and working with our youth workers. Without this valuable contribution of time, energy and expertise we would not have been able to achieve so much.

Any surplus funds, which are not likely to be needed to pay for activities, are placed on deposit to earn interest.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

At the balance sheet date the charity showed unrestricted funds of approximately £126,000 of which £98,332 were held in the charity's bank account.

These reserves are held for future planned activities. The board of trustees are currently in the process of formulating an appropriate reserves policy for the charity.

FINANCIAL REVIEW COVID-

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic SLSA Wales has been badly affected, during which time we were unable to organize and run the following competitions.

- Pool Championships at Swansea University Pool Nippers.
- Pool Championships at Swansea University Pool Seniors/Youth.
- Pool Championships at Swansea University Pool Masters.
- Welsh Ocean Championships Nippers.
- Welsh Ocean Championships Seniors/Youth.
- Welsh Ocean Championships Masters.
- Welsh Team Trials Ranking Events for Seniors/Youth.

All these championships bring in much needed revenue and help us to run SLSA Wales, which is run entirely by volunteers.

The structure we are organized by is:-

- Sport Commission which runs all competitions that are listed above.
- Technical Commission all awards to a professional lifeguard standard (NVBLQ) Lifeguard qualification and youth standards (Level 1 & 2) also Nipper Qualifications to enable them to enter Ocean Competitions safely.
- Youth Commission Nipper Camp and Youth Camp at Celtic Camping, St. David's, Pembroke for over 400 children in attendance.
- IRB Commission -Safety cover for all Ocean based events and examinations taken within SLSA Wales. Teaching younger members how to use the Inshore Rescue Boats (IRB's) safely and how to save anyone in difficulty during a competition or in general at sea when on patrol.
- Board of Trustees which oversea all commissions and make decisions on their behalf.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we have been unable to raise any funds and have received no income for 2020.

FUTURE PLANS

In the coming year we will see a continued emphasis on the Beach Lifesaving and Lifeguard Awards, Nipper Awards and other structured activities to build and deepen the confidence and capability of our young people.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes a charitable incorporated organisation.

This report has been prepared with due regard to guidance published by the Charities Commission on public benefit.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are appointed or reappointed annually at the Annual General Meeting held in March.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

· the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 15% on cost Motor vehicles - 20% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
